Motion text

From line 13 to 14:

All trade agreements by the EU and by European countries must respect the
indigenus rights of the counterpart the indigenous communities directly or indirectly
affected in the counterpart and possibly in neighbouring states. This must entail
respect for ILO Convention 169 alongside core human rights conventions.
Furthermore, these indigenous communities must be consulted and represented in
the discussions and evaluation of the agreement either by a representative or,
where possible, a collective or council representing them

Reason

The amendment:

- 1. Changes respect for indigenous rights to respect for the rights of indigenous
- 2. Comangesities pect to those in the counterpart to further specify those being both directly or indirectly affected, whether that is in the counterpart or
- 3. Soperative similarly to operative clause 2,
- 4. Assiste the sint blustome of funding englus commentations in the discussions and evaluation of the trade agreement.

Why:

- 1. Seemingly a minor change, it is an important distinction. Indigenous peoples affected by trade agreements must have both their basic human rights and
